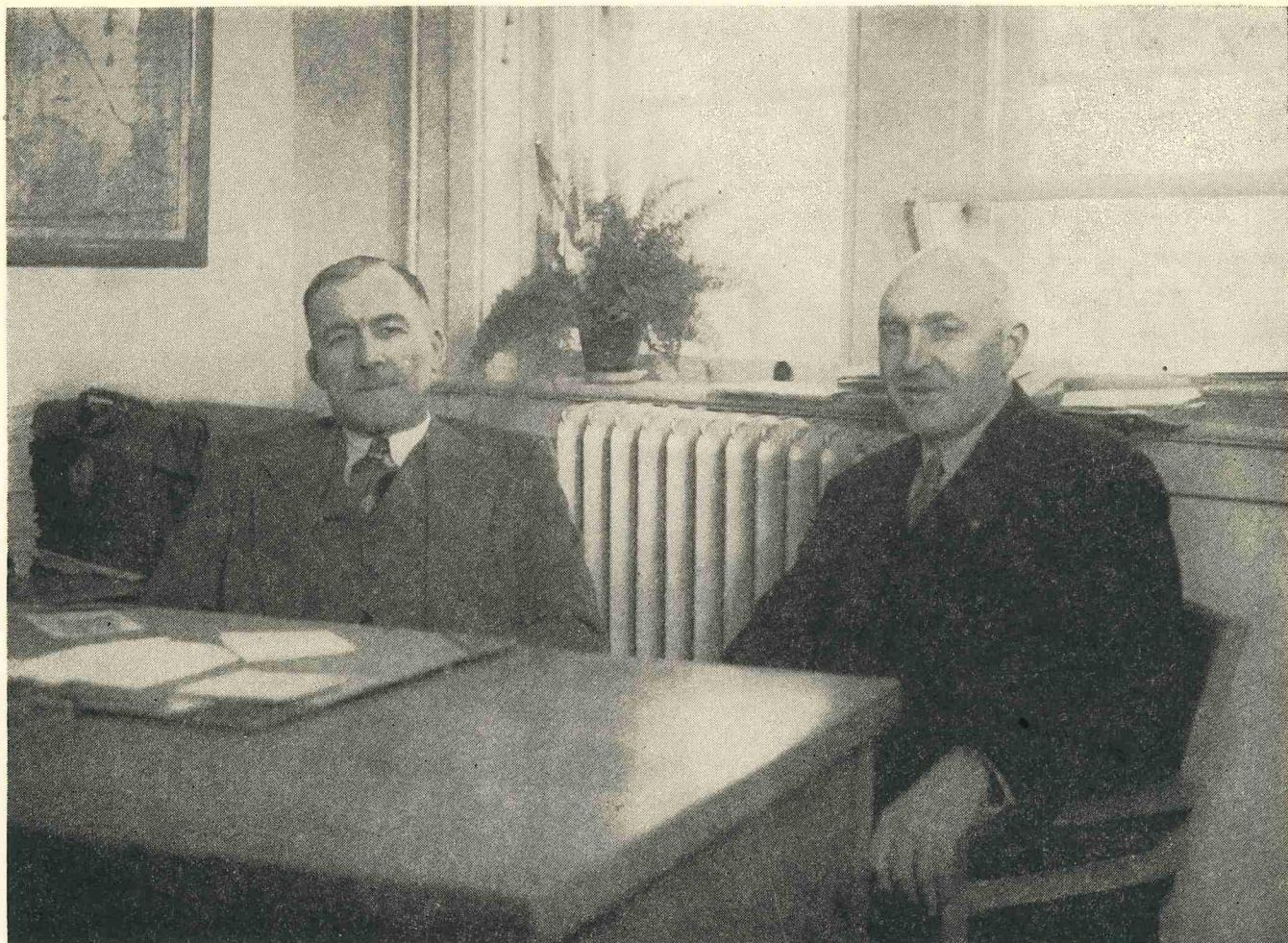

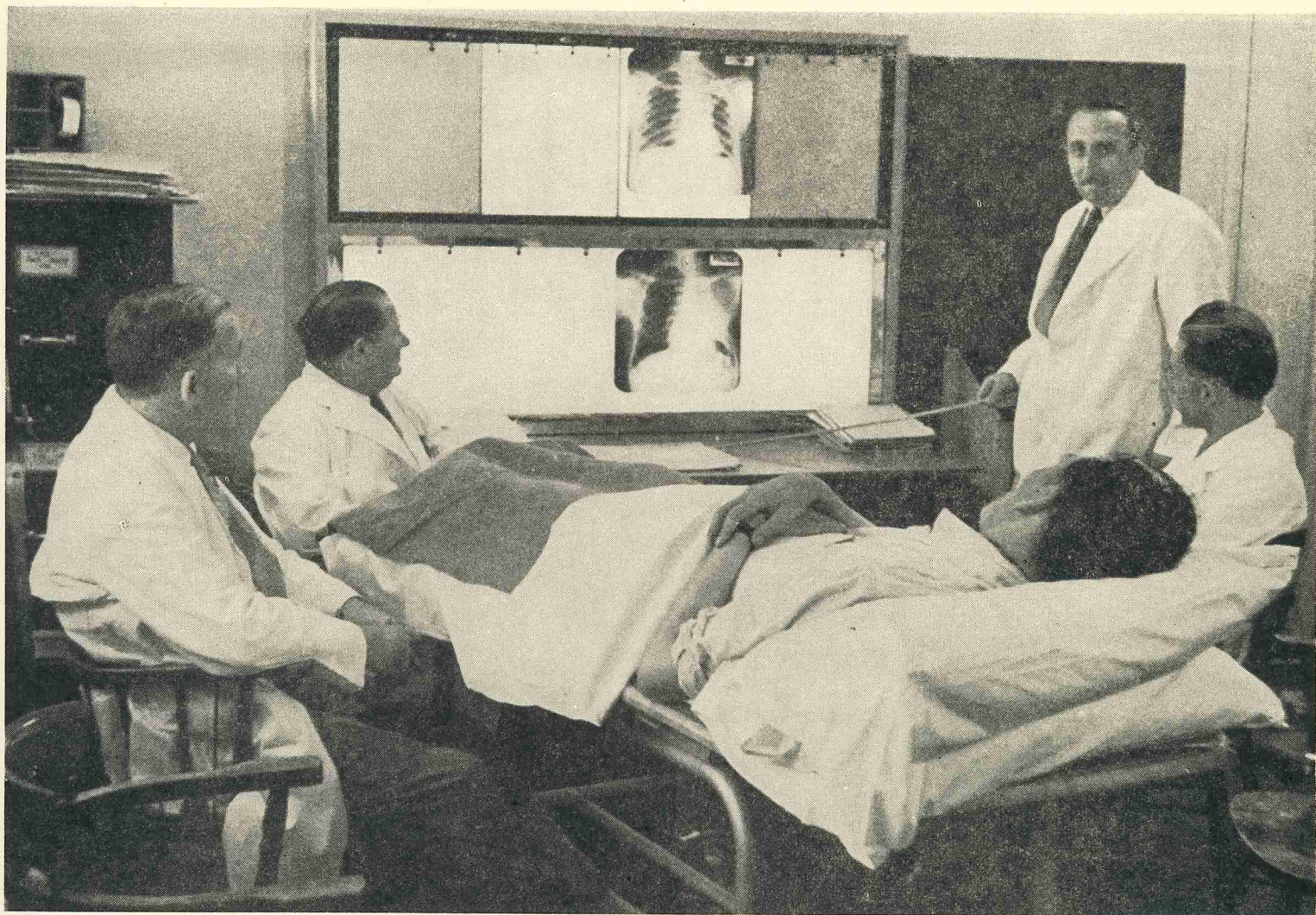
DR. E. L. STONE, formerly Regional Medical Superintendent of Alberta and the Yukon, who retired last July.



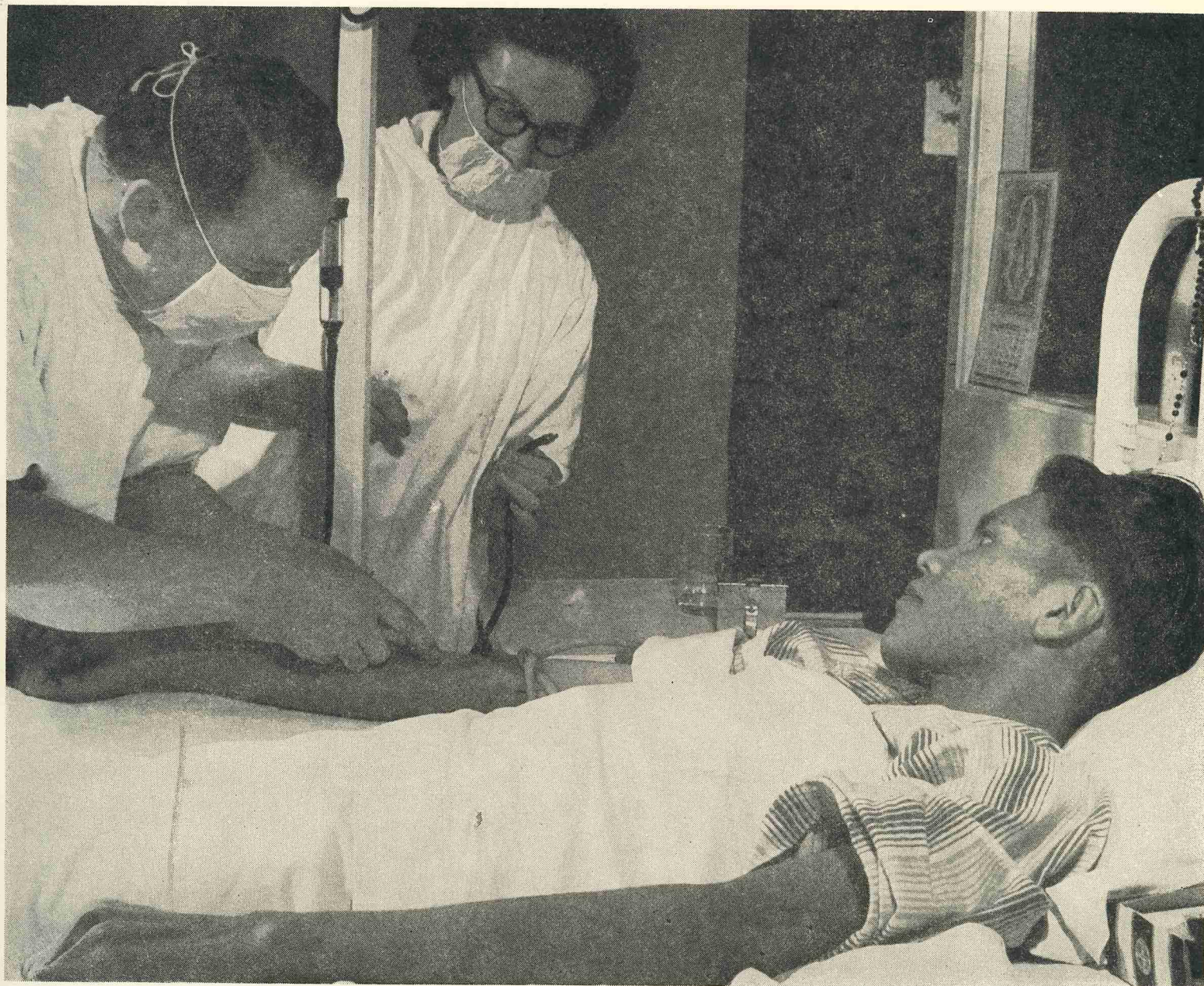

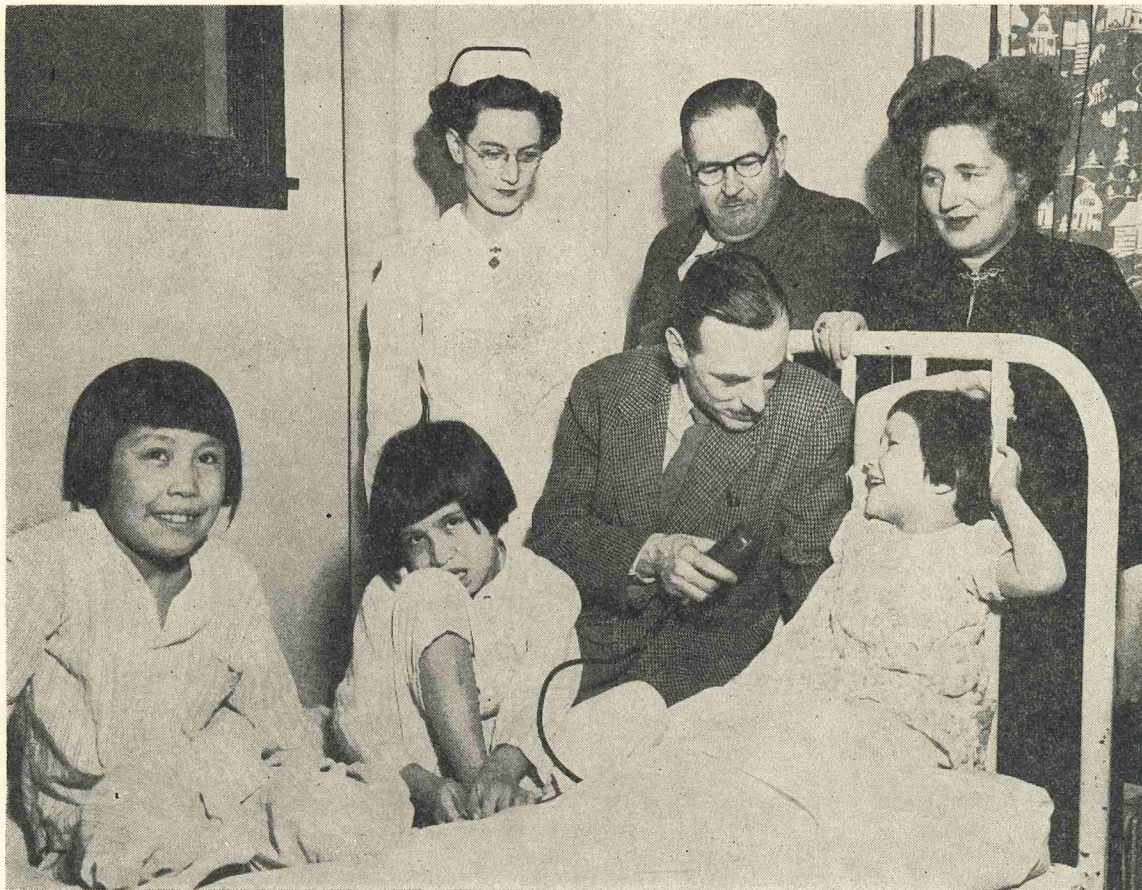

DR. C. McCORMACK, with NURSE E. OLECKO assisting, gives a blood transfusion to patient.

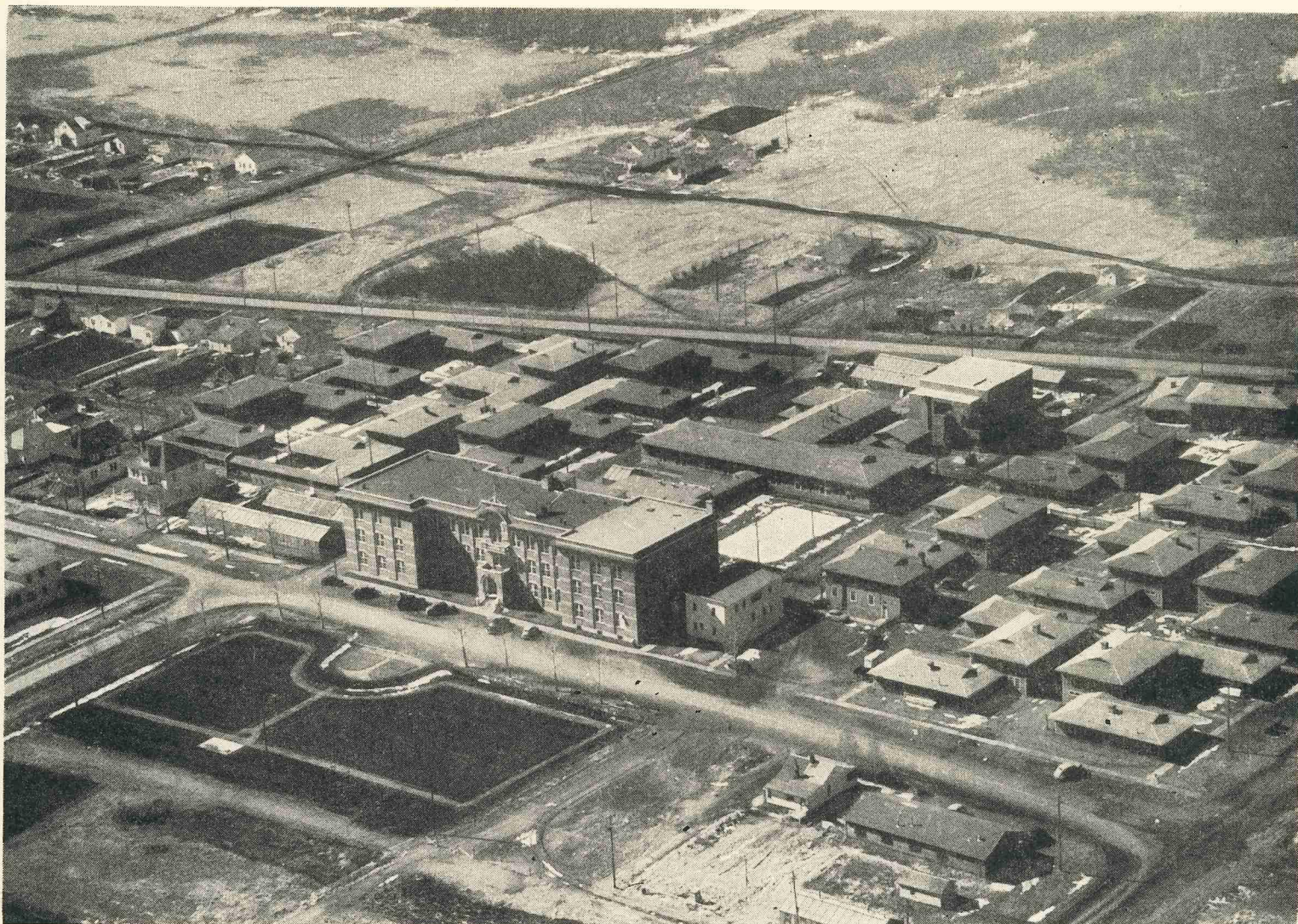

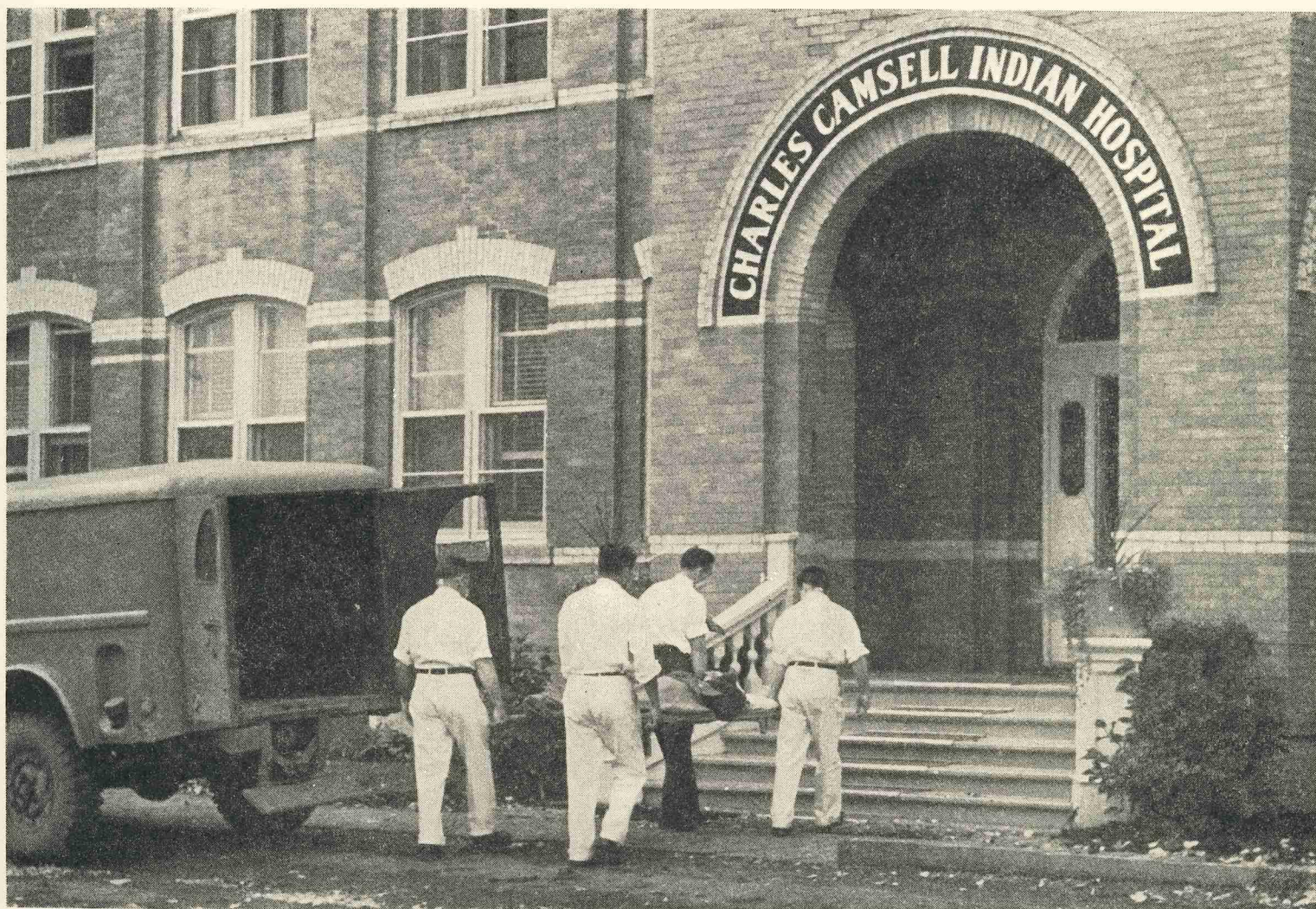

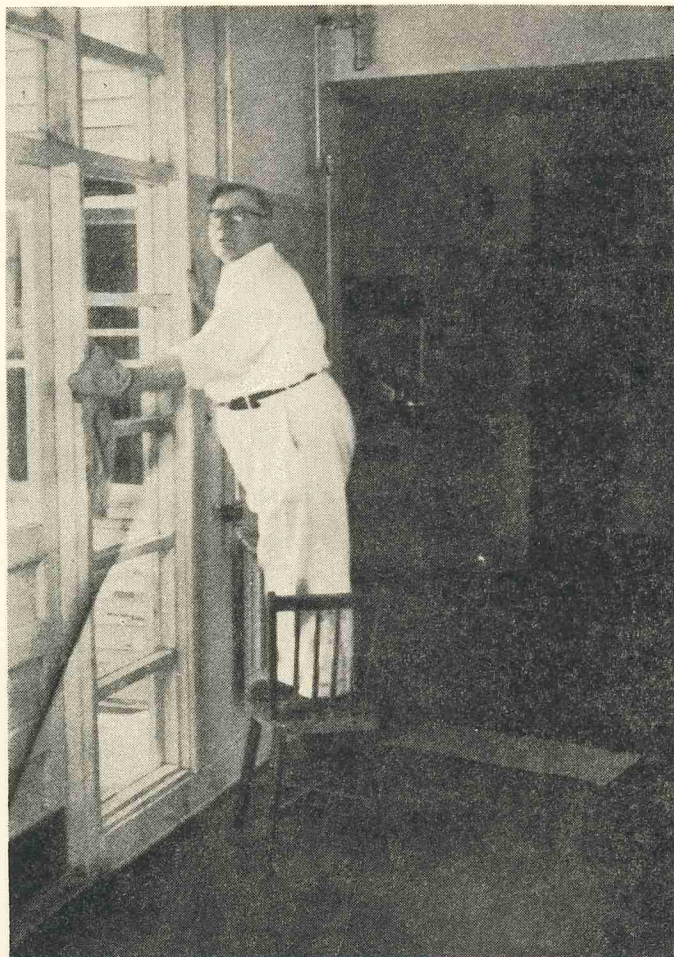

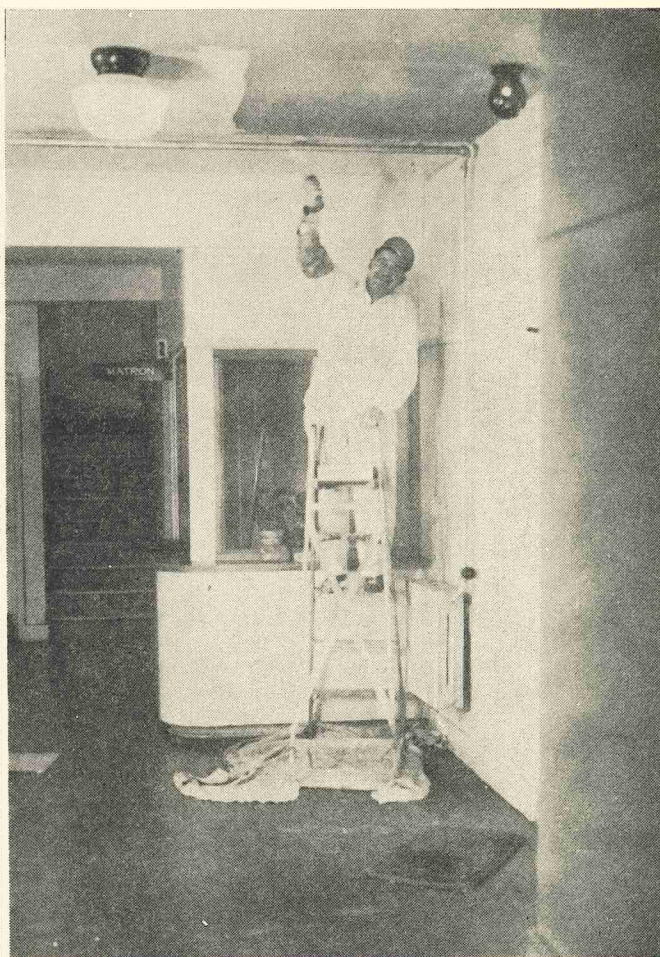

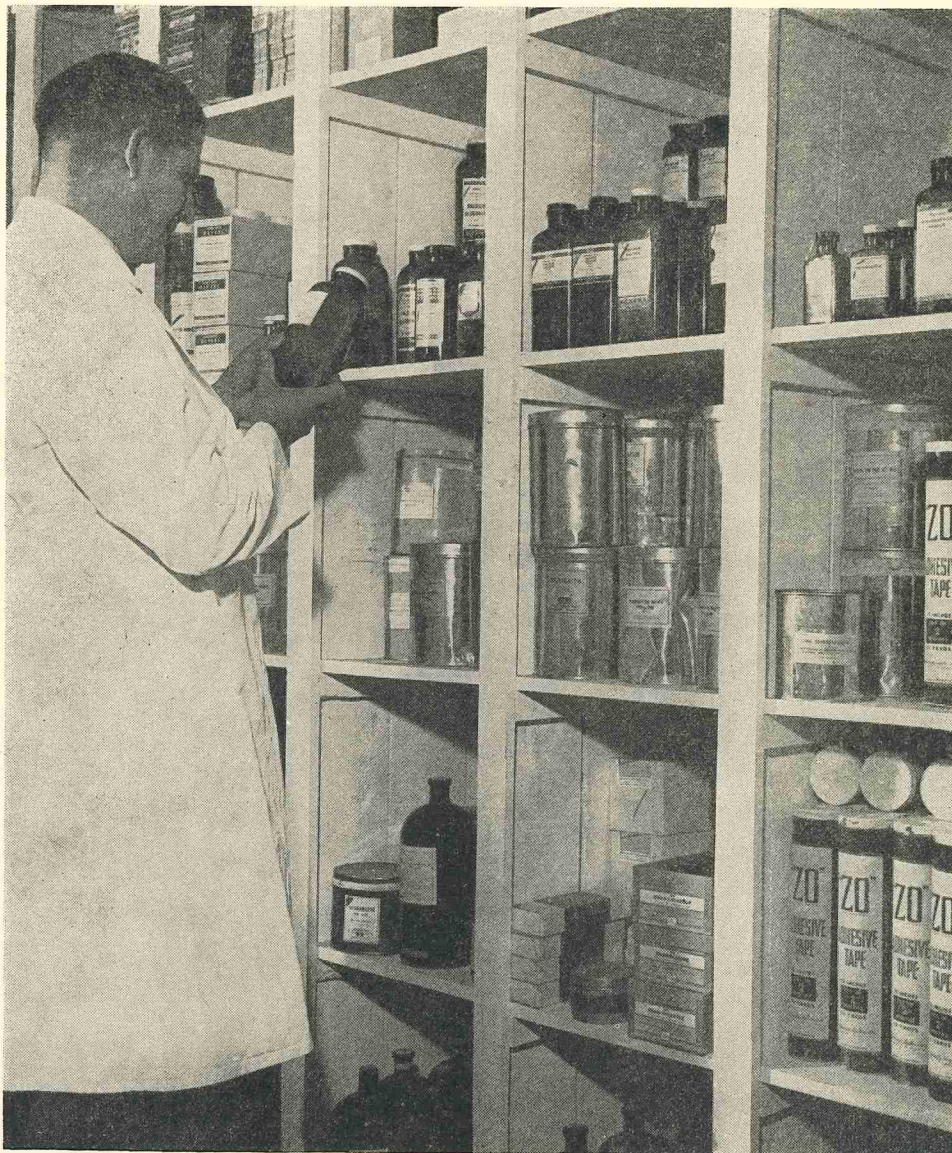
CENTRE PORTION OF Unit 8 (staff living quarters) is being move (across 115 Avenue) to its new site.

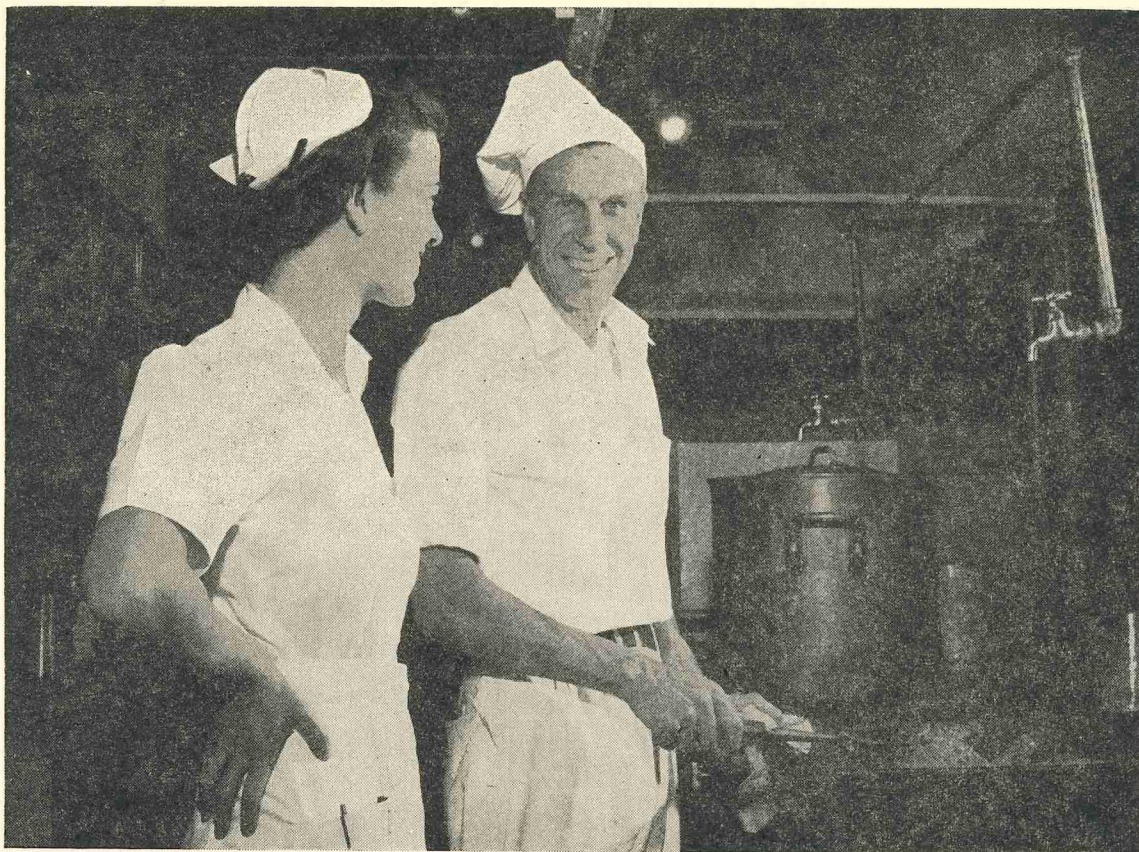

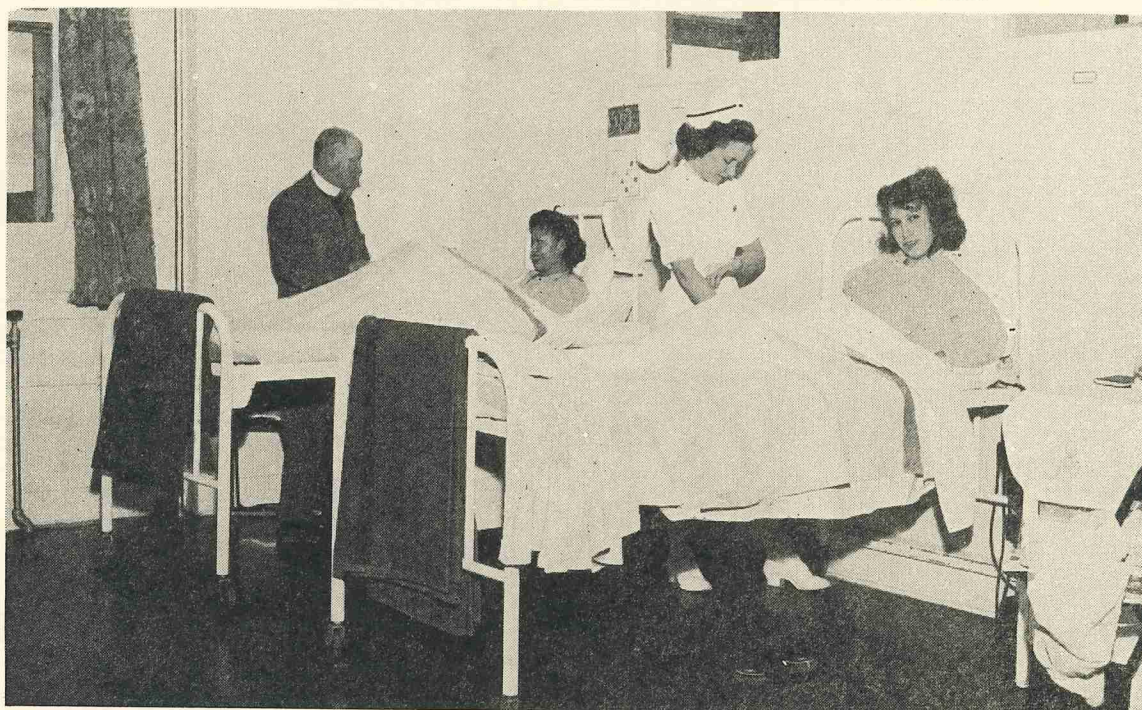

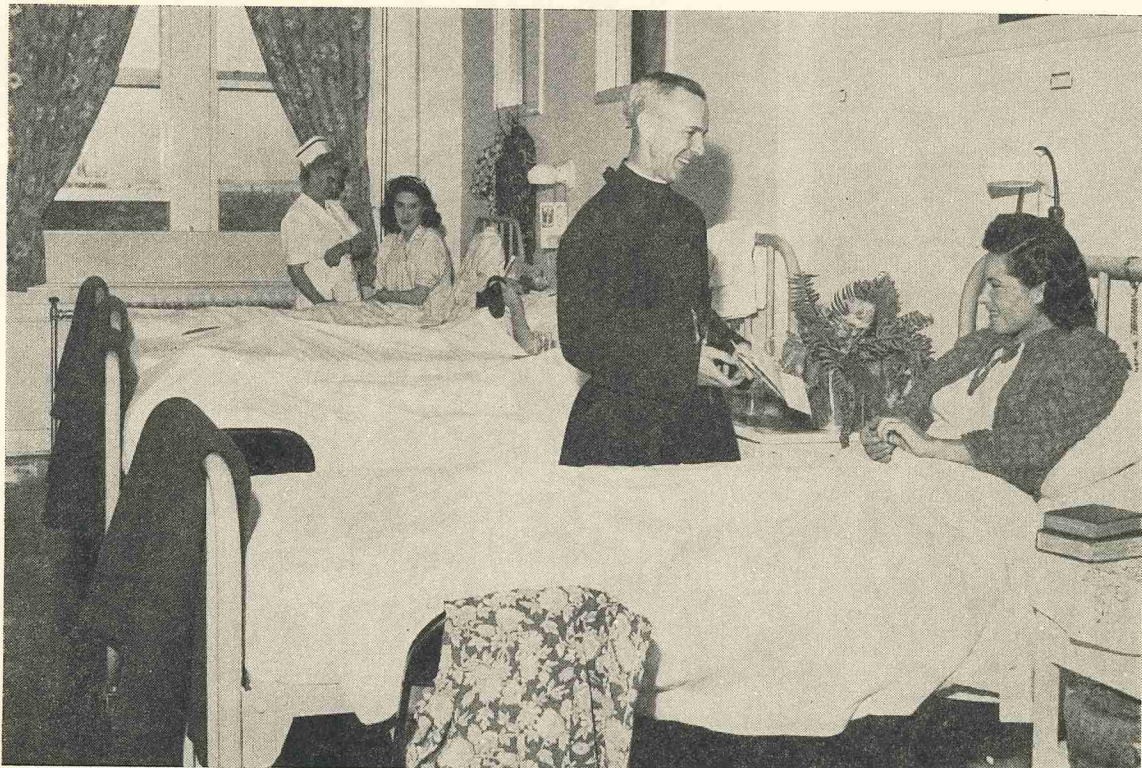

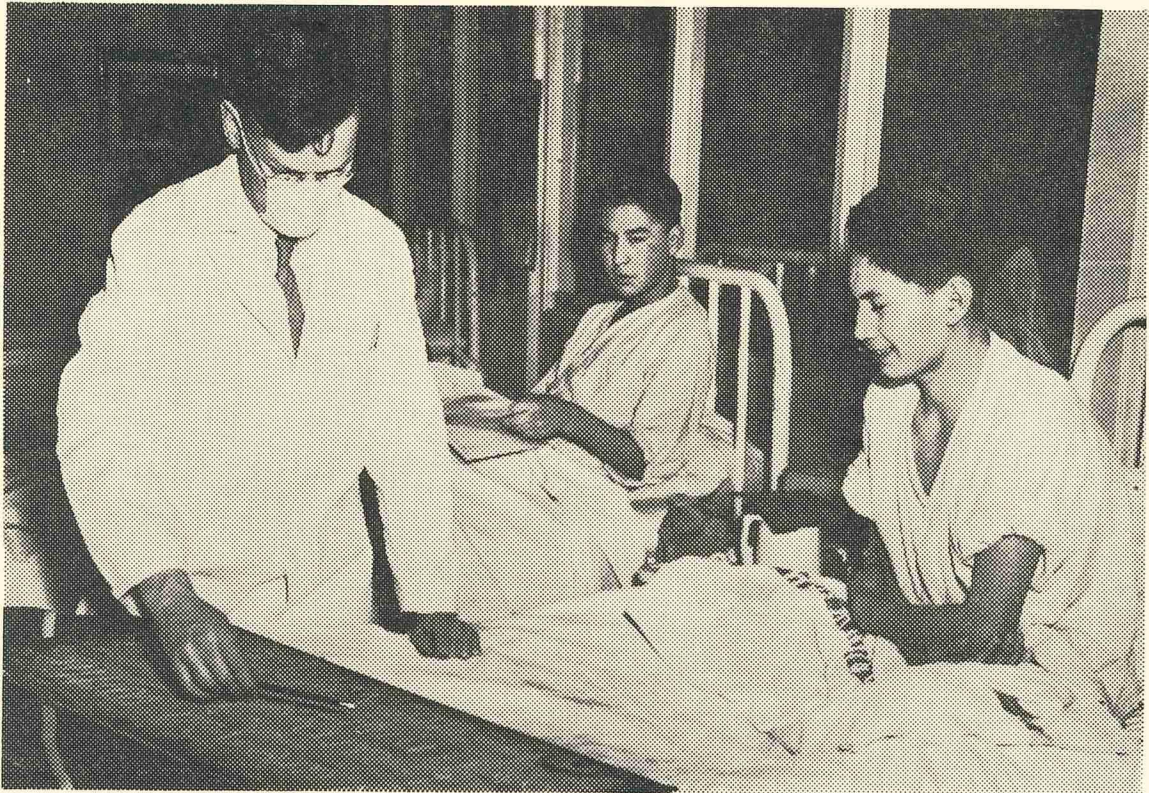

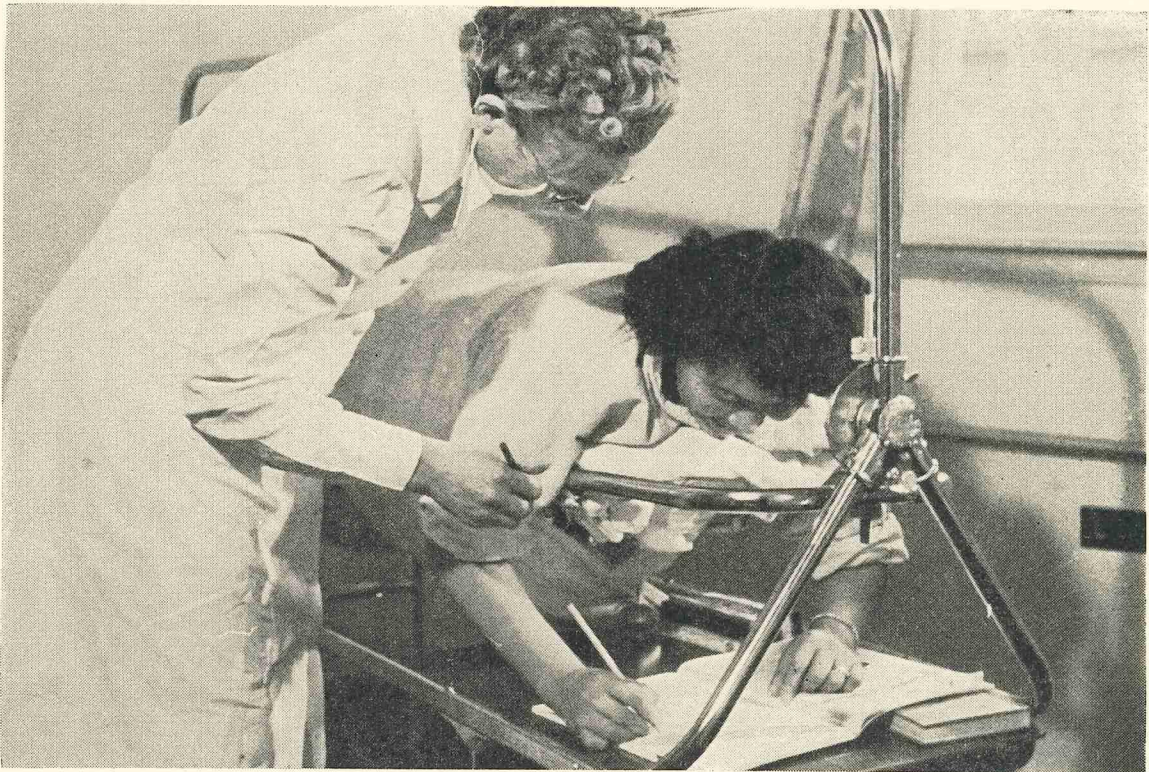

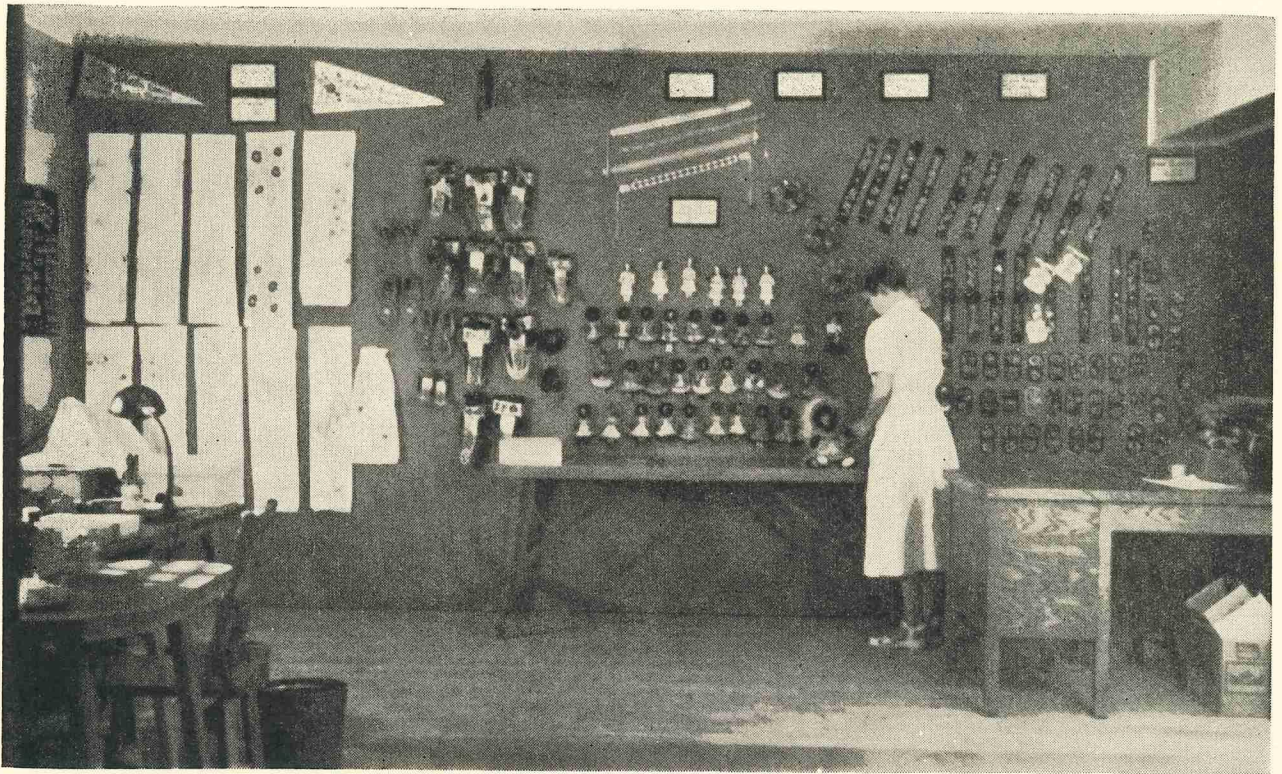

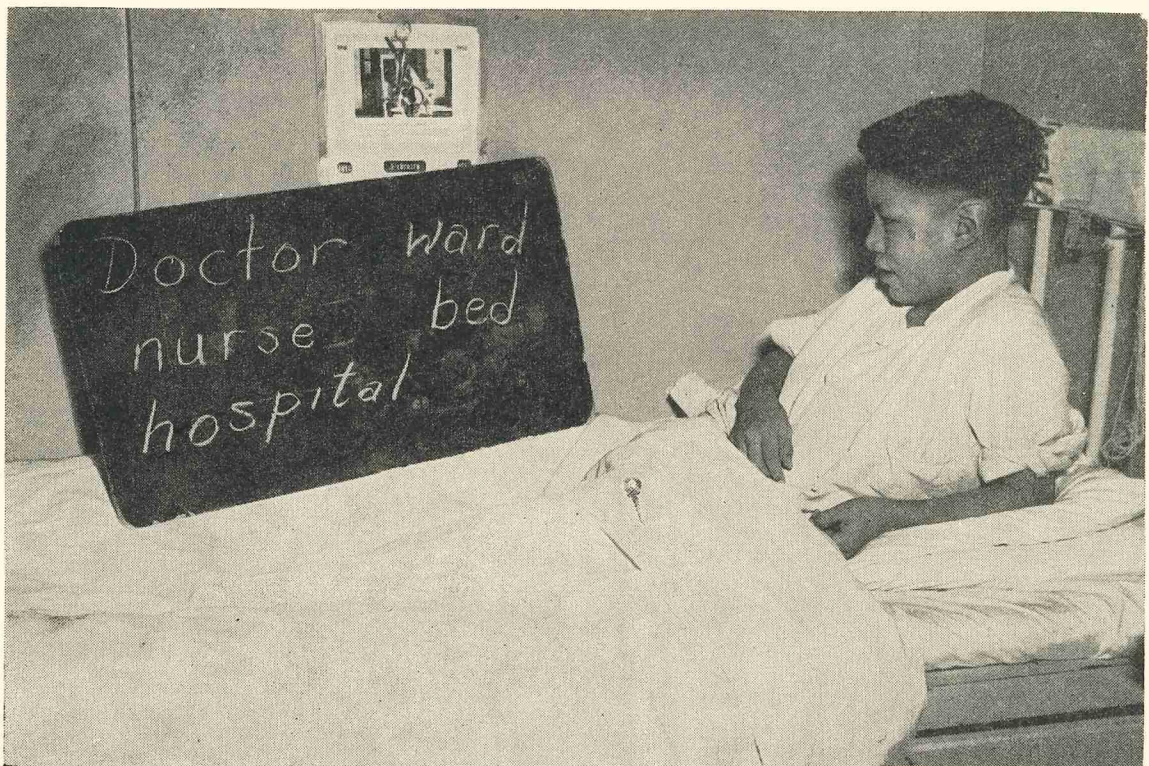

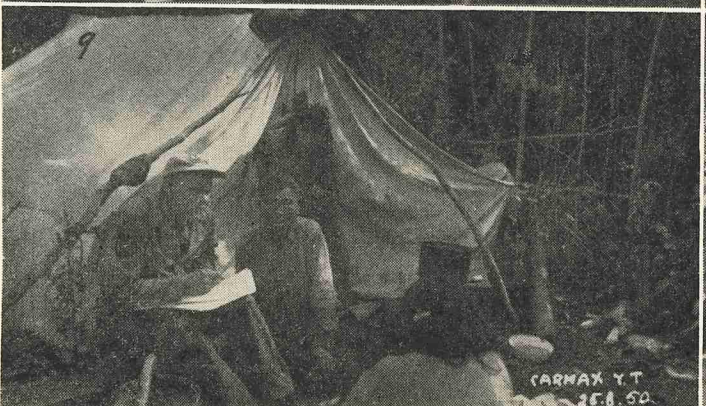
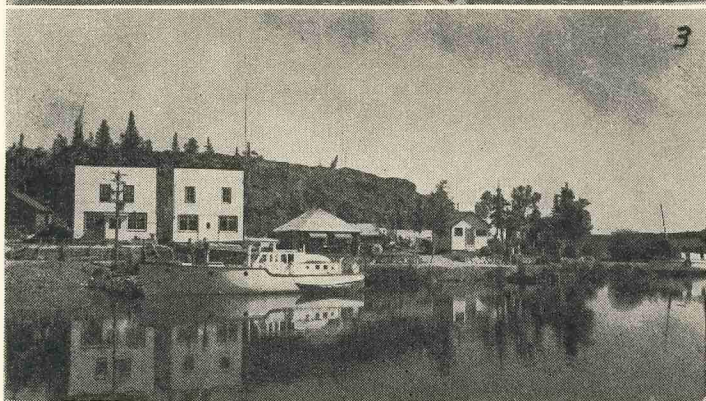
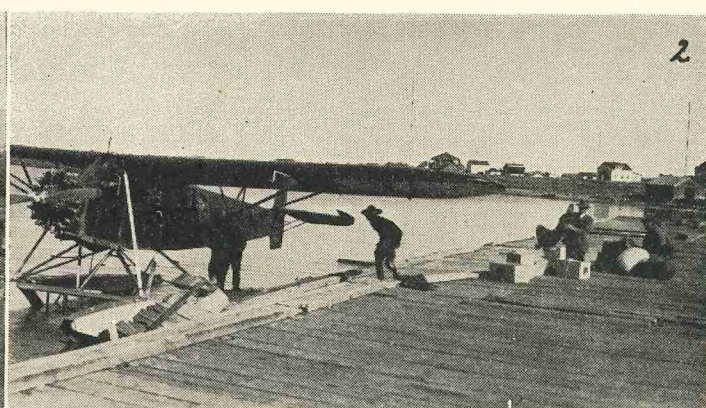

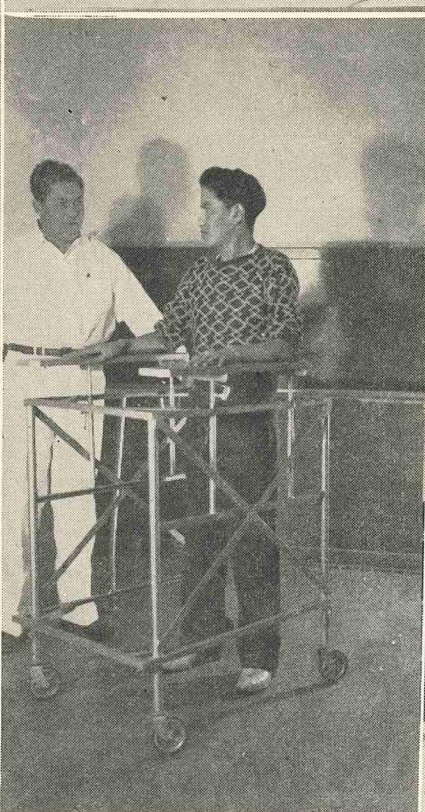
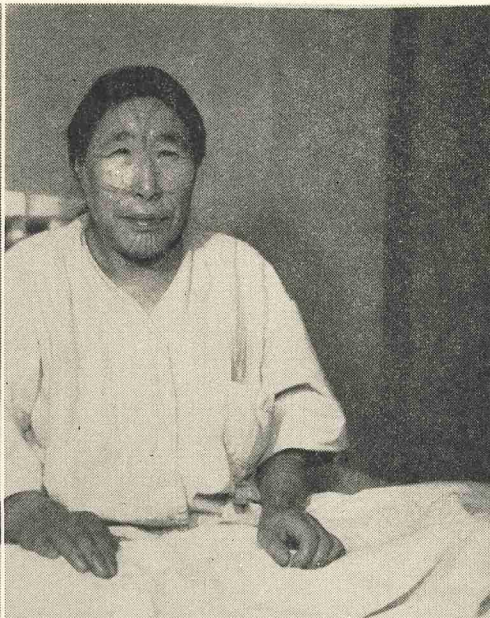
