He stated that he had a petition of 50 street railway employees against it.

> Mr. M. Ainslie, representing Local No. 30, stated that several Federation meetings had been held in regard to this matter and that the members or his Union are among the poorest paid men working for the City, and that they were in favour of the Pension Scheme.

"Tenders have been received for the supply of six (6) thirty-eight (38) passenger trolley buses. Specifications were issued on July 21st and bids closed on September 30th, thus allowing time for British and American manufacturers to submit well considered proposals. Competition has been keen and many of the manufacturers sent representatives to Edmonton. Following is a tabulation of bids received:-

"The American firms make only two axle buses while British manufacturers turn out both two and three axle jobs. Supt. Ferrier, as a result of his visit to United States points and Montreal, is of the definite opinion that the three axle job gives better riding quality. Copies of Mr. Ferrier's letter and Mr. Watson's report are attached.

"In view of their recommendation we finally eliminated all bids except those of the English Electric Company and the Leyland Company which are the only bids submitted on three axle equipment complying with our specified and the Leyland on three axle equipment complying on three axle equipment complying speeds. The decision between the two has been a very close one and we feel that we would get satisfactory equipment from either firm. However in view of the fact all 1938.

Trolley Buses (Tenders)

that both Mr. Ferrier and Mr. Watson have actually examined the English Electric Company's buses in Montreal, your Commissioners agree with them in recommending that the bid of Messrs. Gorman's Limited for English Electric buses be accepted at a price of \$17,053.00 per bus. It is essential that the order be placed immediately as delivery will not be made before next July and all paving improvements have to be done after the buses are running. This means that paving construction will be carried on until near the freeze-up of 1939."

Mr. Chrismas, representing Watrous Limited and Leyland Motor Company, appeared in support of their tender.

Mr. Garnet and Mr. Cunningham, representing Gormans Ltd. who are associated with the English Electric Company in the manufacture of trolley buses, appeared in support of their tender.

Ald. Macdonald was excused and left the meeting.

In reply to the suggestion that three buses be allotted to each company, Mr. Cunningham stated that he would have to get in touch with his factory as to whether they would be willing to put in a supply of parts for three buses.

Mr. Chrismas stated that he would have to wire to find out if they could advance the delivery date on three buses.

Superintendent Ferrier stated that he thought there should be a reserve of power, and that the electrical engineers, Mr. Watson and Mr. McFarlane of the Power Plant, thought that 115 H.P. would be sufficient. Also that he would be satisfied if three buses were allotted to each of the two companies.

That if the Leyland Company can advance the delivery date satisfactory to the Commissioners and provided that the English Electric Company will undertake to put in a stock on consignment to be paid for as the parts are put into the buses - and provided satisfactory arrangements can be made by Commissioner Gibb for a uniform body by both firms - that we award a contract for three English Electric and three Leyland buses.

"There still remains the difficulty, however, of finding the money to lend. It would appear most unlikely that the Dominion Government would advance it without authority at the next session of parliament."
